

Measles precautions

With a measles outbreak confirmed in the Calgary area, clinics and providers are asked to be vigilant in identifying symptomatic patients.

Symptomatic patients should call Health Link at 811 before visiting any health-care facility.

Suspected cases should be reported to the Medical Officer of Health on-call (403-264-5615). Clinics should check immunization records and monitor for symptoms, which include fever, cough, runny nose, red eyes, and rash. More information about symptoms.

Please note that the incubation period from exposure to prodrome is approximately 10 days with a range of seven to 18 days. The incubation period from exposure to rash onset averages 14 days with a range of seven to 21 days.

Patients who present with measles symptoms, or who call the clinic and identify possible exposure, should not be directed to the local emergency department. Resources for clinics and providers include the following:

The measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complications. People born in or since 1970 who have received fewer than two doses of measles-containing vaccine are susceptible to infection. Those who have received fewer than two doses of measles-containing vaccine and are pregnant, under one year of age, are adults and/or have a weakened immune system are at most risk of complications from measles, should contact Health Link at 811.

For pediatric patients, families can text "vaccine record" to 88111 for easier access to Alberta administered vaccines. Health care providers should have a record of two doses, a history of a lab confirmed case, or a titre showing immunity. If you do not have one of these please consider a booster. Travel clinics and some community pharmacies can offer this privately if patients are not able to access public health clinic in a timely fashion.

Alberta Healthy Living Program dietitians

Effective immediately, Alberta Healthy Living Program (AHLP) dietitians in the Calgary Zone are no longer accepting referrals from primary care physicians for nutrition care.

Please note that the change applies only to dietitian consults within AHLP services. All other services remain unchanged. AHLP dietitians will provide specialized nutrition care on a limited basis. For details on accepted referrals, please consult the Alberta Referral Directory.

Pathway, tele-advice updates

Pathways are available to support primary care providers to manage two common conditions that have high referral volumes.

<u>Lower limb ischemia</u> and <u>hematuria</u> referrals are in some cases being denied due to the lack of appropriate work-up or triaging. The pathways may be helpful in clarifying what can be done in the medical home and how best to process referrals.

Temporary closure: Child & adolescent gynecology tele-advice will be closed from Wednesday, April 2 to Friday, April 4. Normal service will resume on Monday, April 7.

Dermatology tele-advice: Dermatology tele-advice is no longer available on Specialist Link. Providers seeking non-urgent advice can request eReferral Consults. Emergent cases should continue to be referred to the dermatology on-call team. <u>More information</u>.

COVID-19 immunization

Effective Friday, March 28, Alberta Health is recommending a biannual dose of COVID-19 vaccine for Albertans at higher risk of severe outcomes due to COVID-19 infection. Eligible Albertans who have previously received a dose of COVID-19 vaccine after October 1, 2024, are eligible to receive a biannual dose at least three months after their previous dose.

Eligible patients include:

- Individuals aged 65 and older
- Adults aged 18 and older who are residents of continuing care or supportive living
- Individuals aged six months and older with immunocompromising conditions
- · First Nations, Metis and Inuit individuals aged six months and older

RSV vaccination: Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccine eligibility has expanded to include community-dwelling seniors aged 70 years and older (previously 75) and First Nations, Metis and Inuit individuals aged 60 and older. Residents of continuing care homes and senior supportive living who are 60 years and older continue to be eligible to receive provincially funded RSV vaccine. More information.

Ambulatory medication information

Effective Thursday, March 20, a new display for Connect Care outpatient medication orders will be available in Netcare and will include the following:

- Data will be updated in real time
- Data will not be available via the Pharmaceutical Information Network (PIN), but as a separate tab in the medication section of Netcare
- Medications listed will be based on medication orders. This means they will be
 prescribed for administration, but not necessarily dispensed or administered, which is
 different than information in PIN that is based on dispensed medications
